

# Motor Vehicles Act 1988

## 1. Introduction

The Motor Vehicles Act is a central legislation in India that regulates all matters related to motor vehicles, transportation systems, and road safety. ## 5. Licensing System

### ► Learner's License

- First step toward driving
- Allows learning under supervision
- Valid for 6 months

### ► Permanent License

- Issued after passing a driving test
- Confirms driving competence

### ► Commercial License

- Required for driving transport vehicles

- Requires higher skills and responsibility

### ► **Importance of Licensing**

- Risks of accidents are minimized

## **6. Registration of Vehicles**

Registration is the legal identification of a vehicle.
